Arizona Survey. A biannual, RDD CATI survey of approximately 500 Arizonans took place in October 1997 concerning the Arizona Juvenile Justice Law, sex education, curricula, and welfare issues surrounding adolescent pregnancy. Principal Investigators: Woody Carter and Teri Nelson.

Vocational Rehabilitation Services. A statewide RDD CATI survey of 600 individuals within Arizona who have a disability will be conducted January through March

1998 to determine which individuals may be eligible for vocational rehabilitation services. The project is funded by the Rehabilitation Services Administration of Arizona. Principal Investigators: Woody Carter and Teri Nelson.

The City of Flagstaff Wage Study. This was an RDD/CATI survey of 501 Flagstaff residents conducted in July 1997 and commissioned by the city to provide its officials and the public with information regarding jobs, wages, and benefits. Principal Investigator: Fred Solop.

A Report on the Social Services Available to Victims of Domestic Violence in the Flagstaff Area. Funded by the city of Flagstaff, this study involved five focus groups: four with victims of domestic violence and one with family and friends of victims. Adolescent Health Study. This project was designed to identify the perceptual barriers that keep African-American adolescents in San Francisco from using health services, particularly those related to reproductive health. Telephone interviews with 302 respondents were completed in July 1997. Principal Investigators: Jonathan Ellen (San Francisco Dept. of Public Health) and James Wiley; Field Director: Janice Clinthorne.

AIDS and Stigma Study. Sponsored by the Natl. Institutes of Health, this study's major goal is to investigate the sources and correlates of Americans' attitudes and beliefs concerning the AIDS epidemic and the influence of these variables on behavior. Baseline CATI interviews of 1,309 respondents from a random sample and 403 respondents from an African American oversample were completed in June. Survey of African Americans. This broad survey of African Americans' values and attitudes was funded by the Natl. Science Foundation. Survey topics included civil rights, affirmative action, prejudice, and political attitudes. PhDs—Ten Years Later. This mail survey of nearly 6,000 Ph.D. recipients from 61 participating universities is part of a study of the career paths of individuals who earned doctorates in biochemistry, computer science, electrical engineering, English, math, and political science approximately 10 years ago, funded by the Andrew Mellon Foundation and the Natl. Science Foundation. Principal Investigators (Univ. of California at Berkeley) : Joseph Cerny and Maresi Nerad.

National School Network Survey. The second wave of this multistage mail survey was completed in June 1997 and included 250 schools (K through 12). The survey, sponsored by the National School Network Testbed, is aimed at increasing use and connectivity of the Internet in educational settings. Los Angeles County Social Survey 1997. This annual CATI survey monitors items of general interest, including racial attitudes, ethnic identity, political and social beliefs, and community satisfaction among 800 Los Angeles county residents. Georgia State Poll. This poll, conducted on a quarterly basis, averages 800 respondents, 400 from the five-county metro area and 400 from non-metro areas. Coordinator: Paul Vaughn

Evaluation of Georgia's Pre-Kindergarten Program and Its Impact on Elementary Grades. For the Council for School Performance, site visits of pre-kindergarten programs are being made July 1997 to June 1998, and focus groups and interviews are being conducted with elementary school teachers to assess their impressions of the preparedness of pre-kindergarten students for the elementary grades, changes in teaching practices and curriculum in lower elementary grades due to the program, and anticipated changes as the children progress through elementary school. Georgia's HOPE Scholarship and the Decision to Attend College: A Longitudinal Study. Earned Doctorates (SED)/Survey of Doctorate Recipients (SDR). This project, to continue through 2001, supports the Natl. Science Foundation's Data System on Scientists and Engineers. The SED annually (since 1922) collects information from all research doctorates earned in the U.S. The longitudinal SDR (biennially since 1973) of 55,000 science and engineering PhDs uses CATI and self-administered questionnaires and is expected to be completed by January 1998. Project Director: Patricia Green.

Drug Injectors' Risk Networks and HIV Transmission. Sponsored by the Natl. Institute on Drug Abuse, this study will assess the structure and dynamics of drug-injection and sexual risk networks on HIV risk behaviors among injection drug users. This four-wave (1997–2001) prospective study of 200 index subjects and 600 of their sexual and injection partners in Washington, D.C. uses CAPI and ethnographic methods. Flooding & Drainage in Marion County. Sponsored by Marion County's Dept. of Capital Asset Management, this project assessed citizens' perceptions of storm water drainage and the degree of support to fund improvements that deal with storm water problems. More than 1,800 CATI interviews were completed in April with a random sample of adults in each of Marion County's nine townships. Project Manager: Lana Bandy.

The Effectiveness of Indiana University's Recent Advertising Campaigns. Indiana University sponsored this research to determine Indiana residents' opinions about the University, how people get information about IU and the effectiveness of a recent advertising campaign. CATI interviews of 1,000 Indiana residents, selected by RDD from every Indiana county, were completed in June. Project Manager: Jill Bakehorn.

Marion County Race Relations. The *Indianapolis Star/News* sponsored this study to determine Marion county residents' views on race relations. Respondents included 200 Whites and 200 African-Americans, who were asked to describe the race relations climate in the area and whether progress has been made in the past five years. Public Support for an Increase in the Tobacco Tax. This study, sponsored by the Indiana Division of the American Cancer Society, aimed to determine how Hoosiers feel about tobacco use in the state and to measure support for additional taxes to be used to combat tobacco use among children and young adults. Wausau School District. Family-Owned Businesses Project. A two-phase study is being conducted for a consortium of 17 universities in the U.S. and Canada. Phase One used CATI to identify households with businesses. In-depth interviews with 1,400 business owners and household managers are being conducted for Phase Two. Questions address business and family composition, activities and goals, financial status, and the impact the business and family have on each other. Data collection began June 1997 and will continue until winter. Study Coordinator: Diane Anderson.

Study of Voice Disorders. This CATI study, funded by the Natl. Institutes of Deafness and Other Communicable Disorders, is being conducted for physicians at the Univs. of Iowa and Utah Medical Schools. Data will be collected over the next two years on the frequency, risk factors, and symptoms of voice disorders of a sample of 1,800 teachers and 1,800 members of the general population. Site Study on Cultural Competence. Funded by the Massachusetts Div. of Medical Assistance, this study seeks information from every MassHealth (Medicaid) service delivery location in Massachusetts. A respondent designated by the agency at each of 2,600 sites will be contacted for a 20-minute CATI interview on the racial, ethnic, and cultural aspects of health care delivery. Interviews are expected to be completed February 1998. Study Director: Brian Clarridge.

Experiences Related to Euthanasia Among Severely Ill Cancer Patients. In a study of end-of-life care, funded by the American Cancer Society and sponsored by the Dana Farber Cancer Institute, 300 terminal cancer patients will be interviewed at two points in time about their care choices. Hospice and standard care options are the focus of the research. The study will consist of personal interviews of outpatients associated with three major Boston hospitals. American Society of Clinical Oncology Self-Study. Members of the American Society of Clinical Oncology will be surveyed about their knowledge, attitudes, beliefs, and standards of practice with respect to end-of-life care.

Approximately 9,000 members will be sent a mail questionnaire, and a stratified subsample of 1,550 will be further reminded through telephone followup. 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The Fear of Weight Gain as a Barrier to Smoking Cessation in Women Study. This study, funded by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation through its Substance Abuse Policy Research Program, will try to assess the importance of women's contemplation of weight gain as a barrier to quitting smoking. CATI telephone interviews with a national random sample of 1,200 women smokers, ex-smokers, and nonsmokers will be conducted. Principal Investigators: Cynthia Pomerleau and Abigail Stewart; Study Director: Steve Pennell; Project Coordinator: Patty Mahr.

1997 NES Pilot Study. The National Election Pilot study, funded by the Natl. Science Foundation, continues the NES's panel study of citizen reaction to major political events in the U.S. and pilots new questions on respon-

dent perceptions of group placement and affiliation. It also includes interviewer-activated time stamps to collect data on response latency. This fall, 500 interviews were conducted. Principal Investigator: Virginia Sapiro; Study Directors: Kathy Cirksena and Steve Pennell; Survey Manager: Stephen Berry.

Women's Employment Study. A list sample of 700 single mothers aged 18–54 residing in Genesee County, MI, primarily in the city of Flint, will be asked about employment experiences, child care arrangements, health, and other issues involved in the transition from welfare to job training and employment. Funding for this first wave of a proposed three-wave study is being provided by the C.S. Mott Foundation. The project is a collaborative effort with researchers from the UM School of Social Work. Principal Investigators: Sandra K. Danziger, Richard Tolman, and Mary Corcoran; Data Collection Study Director; Steve Pennell; Survey Manager: Bruce Medbery.

Health of Persian Gulf War Veteran Women. SRC's Survey Services Lab is assisting in the development and administration of this mail survey for Penny Pierce at the UM School of Nursing. Funded by the Dept. of Defense under the Tri-Service Nursing Research Program, the project will survey 2,400 female U.S. Air Force personnel who served during the Persian Gulf War, to gather information on general and gender-specific health issues. Principal Investigator: Penny Pierce; Project Coordinators: Stephanie Chardoul and Sara Freeland.

The University of Michigan Trucking Industry Project. For this study, funded by a grant from the Sloan Foundation through the UM School of Business, 400 truck drivers at 20 randomly selected truck stops in Michigan, Ohio, Indiana, and Wisconsin will be surveyed about the type of work they do, their working conditions, and their opinions on such issues as pay, work, and government regulation. Principal Investigators: Dale Belman, (Univ. of Wisconsin at Milwaukee, Department of Economics); Michael Belzer (UM Inst. of Labor and Industrial Relations), Robert Haessler, (UM School of Business Administration), and Chelsea White, (UM College of Engineering); Project Coordinators: Lisa Finegan and Julie Ballin.

Health and Retirement 1998. This year the Health and Retirement Study (HRS) and the Assets and Health Dynamics among the Oldest Old (AHEAD) will be combined into one data collection effort and new cohort samples of people born between 1924–1930 and 1942–1947 will be added. The project, funded by NIA, will collect 23,000 interviews. One of the goals of the study is to develop an understanding of the factors that affect the decision to retire and the consequences of retirement on health and economic well-being. Veerkamp and Tina Mainieri.

Monitoring the Future. This project has been conducted since 1975 and is designed to track changes in the attitudes and behaviors of American youth regarding the use of alcohol, tobacco and drugs, as well as their attitudes toward school and government policies. In 1997, 86 interviewers from the National Field Team interviewed junior high and high school students in more than 425 schools across the U.S. and tracked non-respondents to a mail followup questionnaire. Principal Investigators: Lloyd Johnston, Jerald Bachman, and Patrick O'Malley; Project Manager: Marcy Breslow.

Psychosocial Correlates of Adolescent Driving Surveys. Sponsored by the Univ. of Michigan Transportation Research Institute (UMTRI) and funded by NIAAA, the objective of this project is to collect data to help explain adolescent high-risk driving behavior, particularly alcohol-related driving behavior. The telephone survey involves interviews with a sample of 10,400 young adults, whose average age will be 24. The second survey is scheduled to start two years later with a separate sample of 2,500 young adults. Principal Investigators: Patricia Waller and Jean Shope (UMTRI); Project Manager: Steve Pennell.

Study of Breastfeeding Practices and Mastitis. This study examines the relationship between breastfeeding habits and styles and incidences of lactation mastitis. Participants, recruited in Detroit and Omaha, were interviewed on four different occasions at three-week intervals. Six months following the fourth interview, a follow-up mail questionnaire was administered. After three years of data collection, approximately 900 women have been interviewed, toward a goal of 1,200 completed interviews. Principal Investigator: Betsy Foxman (UM School of Public Health); Survey Manager: Tina Mainieri.

From January to March 1997, 1,124 CATI interviews were conducted as part of the third year of this annual survey that measures experience with crime and household violence and fear of crime in the 7-county metropolitan area. The survey is funded by Greater St. Paul Tomorrow. Study Director: Paul Mattessich.

St. Paul Head Start Transition Demonstration Evaluation. This quasi-experimental, longitudinal study is part of the National Head Start/Public School Early Childhood Demonstration Project. It measures the performance of two cohorts of 500 students in St. Paul schools: one

cohort started kindergarten in 1992, the other in 1993. Nearly half of each cohort is composed of Hmong children who come from non-English speaking homes. Study Director: Dan Mueller.

1998 National Household Survey on Drug Abuse (NHSDA). Data will be collected quarterly throughout 1998 on 25,000 individuals aged 12 and older for NHSDA, funded by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration. NHSDA is a self-administered PAPI survey and includes over-sampling in the states of Arizona and California. Project Director: Tom Virag; National Field Director: Brian Burke.

School Health Policies and Programs Study—2000. Sponsored by the CDC, Div. of Adolescent and School Health, this study will assess the status of school health programs and policies, and the attainment of relevant goals from Healthy People 2000 and the National Education Goals. 1997 National Health Survey. This survey is a program of the Inst. for Health Policy and Health Services Research at the University of Cincinnati. The 1997 survey included questions on women's health issues, national health reform, satisfaction with quality and availability of health care, and knowledge of risk factors associated with stroke. CATI interviews were conducted with a nationwide RDD sample of 1,068 adults in July. Project Director: Alfred Tuchfarber.

Cincinnati Metropolitan Housing Authority Resident Needs Assessment Survey. This is the third annual survey of residents intended to assess general satisfaction with CMHA housing and maintenance, neighborhood and surroundings, and enforcement of CMHA regulations. CATI interviews were conducted in September 1997 with a list sample of 300 current adult residents. Project Director: Kim Downing.

Convention Center Expansion Survey. The purposes of this survey were to determine the importance of several proposed development projects among voters registered in the Greater Cincinnati area and support for various methods of financing the expansion of the Greater Cincinnati Convention Center. Social Impact of Gambling in Oregon Survey. The RDD CATI project examined the attitudes of 400 Oregon adults about the social impacts and social costs of state-sponsored gambling and Indian gaming in Oregon. Principal Investigator: Stephen Johnson; Project Director: Craig Helmstetter.

Oregon Dept. of Transportation Omnibus Internal Survey. This project measured the experiences and attitudes of 775 ODOT employees in three internal service

The Breast Cancer Core Questionnaire Project. With funding from the Natl. Action Plan on Breast Cancer, Office of Women's Health, and the Natl. Cancer Institute, a core questionnaire and modules were developed that will be used in studies of breast cancer etiology. The questionnaire includes sociodemographic and cultural factors, medical history, diet, lifestyle, environmental exposures, and occupational history. Eighteen focus groups were conducted among white, African-American, Hispanic and multiracial women in Washington, D.C.; Baltimore; South Bend, IN; Mason City, IL; Philadelphia; and San Francisco. Project Director: Ellen Werner.

Evaluating Family Experiences with Clients and Services in Ohio. This study for Richard Tessler, Univ. of Massachusetts Social & Demographic Research Institute, is funded by the Ohio Dept. of Mental Health. It will evaluate family experiences in caring for a relative with a serious mental illness, assess that relative's insurance coverage for mental health services, and gather family evaluations of mental health services. This year, 125 family members interviewed in 1996 will be asked to participate in a third and final 45-minute CATI interview.

Respondents had been named by persons with serious mental illness as someone they could count on to help them out from time to time. Study Director: Ellin Spector.

Drug Use and Other Deviant Adaptations: Two Generations. Data collected for this NIDA-funded study will be used to study first-generation deviant adaptations and the onset and intergenerational transmission of patterns of drug abuse and other deviant adaptations to stress for second-generation adolescents. Grandma's Kids: An Intergenerational Drug Prevention Project.
